Rebecca tames tough event

Tenacious Old Scholar Rebecca Baylis (2004) put in a sensational performance at the Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships in Brisbane earlier this year.

The 18-year-old was selected for the Australian Under-19 Team, the first time



she had made the team after four attempts. The championships tested competitors on swimming, simulated emergency responses and CPR.

Rebecca said the toughest event was the 100m "mannequin carry with fins". In this event competitors swim 50m under water, collect a 80-90kg mannequin from the bottom of the pool, and then swim another 50m ensuring the mannequin's head is above the water.

OLD SCHOLARS SOCCER REACHES NEW HEIGHTS

Formed in 2004 and competing in the collegiate league, the club came extremely close to winning a championship in its debut season.

Falling short and finishing equal top, it was a single goal that denied Gleeson FC a championship in its first year of existence. Some would argue that the 3 points earned against St Peter's Old Scholars would have sealed it, only to be stripped of those valuable points when they (St Peter's) failed to see out the entire season.

In 2005 Gleeson FC launched into the SA Amateur League, competing in the Saturday, Division 2 League. Now fielding both seniors and reserves, the club has grown from a single team to a group of about 30 quality players.


