GROOMING REMINDER FOR STUDENTS > HAIR

At Gleeson College, we strongly emphasise the appropriate wearing of all aspects of the uniform and that this responsibility will always belong to the student. However, we regard your support and encouragement as invaluable in helping your child follow the expectations of our Uniform Policy at Gleeson College. While this is a specific reminder relating to grooming and student hairstyles, greater detail relating to the College uniform is provided on the College website (www.gleeson.sa.edu.au).

Hairstyles must be kept in a clean, neat and tidy manner at all times.

Hairstyles are to be moderate and not extremes of style. For example, undercuts, significant differences in length, lines or symbols cut into the hair, dreadlocks, etc. are not permitted. All students with hair below collar length or which falls or has the potential to fall across the eyes must be restrained with simple black, grey, maroon or white hair ties or ribbons (clips and headbands are not deemed sufficient).

Artificially coloured hair other than in natural colour is not permitted; this includes brightly coloured streaks or highlights and obvious variations in colour, which draw attention. Items used

to restrain hair must be maroon, grey, brown or black and accessories such as flowers, feathers, 'scrunchies' and wide headbands/bandannas are not permitted. Hair extensions, including eyelash extensions, are not permitted. Braided hair is not permitted unless prior approval is sought from the Principal. Facial hair and excessive side burns below the middle of the ear are not permitted.

quickly leapt into action to plan fun-filled day for 7ROG and 7ZAC focusing on the life and achievements of Leonardo da Vinci.

Students began the day with a quick Italian warmup and introductory video to Leonardo's life before leaping right into preparing their interviews for our very own 'Radiolotiana' after Leonardo had demonstrated his! While initially nervous, all students did a fantastic job introducing themselves 'live on air'.

After recess, students completed a Timeline Challenge where they had to use various clues around the classroom to piece together a timeline of Leonardo's life. They received a bonus clue or tip if they could successfully ask the teachers *che cos'è* (what's this) or the whole team introduced themselves in Italian. This task allowed them to gain an appreciation of the huge range of Leonardo's accomplishments, from art to science to weaponry and engineering. Next, students learnt about Leonardo's various inventions, discoveries and experiments with wind, forces of motion and gravity by making a prototype parachute similar to that which Leonardo experimented with hundreds of years ago.

And now to the highlight of the day for many students - PIZZA! While some were disappointed by the lack of ham and pineapple, students were able to sample more authentic Italian flavours such as plain pomodoro or margherita. After lunch, students let their creativity and artistic flair out to make dazzling masks fit for the carnevale!



YEAR 9 HASS > World War 1 Research Hits Home for Students

This term in Year 9 HaSS we have been studying about World War One. The assignment task for this topic was to research a South Australian that served in WW1 and learn about their life before the war, in what way they served and then life post war.

Students made great use of the Virtual War Memorial Website (<https://vwma.org.au/>) in which you can research individuals and take a look at the daily Honour roll. One of our students, Jonathon Ierace (9 HMDIT), gave a heartfelt presentation on 'John Francis Simmons' who was born in Adelaide and first tried to enlist when he was 15 years old. Jonathon wrote in his task reflection:

"Researching this topic actually affected me rather more severely than I first thought. Seeing and hearing about the conditions and everything which they had to go through made me quite frankly feel horrified just imagining it all. This topic also made me realize just how lucky we are. Just to think, if I was the exact age I am today back then, I would've been being urged to go and fight for our country at such a young age.

Through researching WW1, I've come to the realization of just how important the people who protect and serve our country are. These people quite surely do not receive anywhere near as much recognition as they deserve for what they do."

It has been a great process to go through with the Year 9 students as we come to a better understanding of our past, so we can be informed citizens of tomorrow.

YEAR 11 F&H > Modern Australian Menu with Native Flavour Twists!



The Year 11 Food and Hospitality Class impressed guests with their Modern Australian Menu last week!

We had a great time planning and delivering our function - as a class we were handed the brief to cater to a group of invited guests and showcase seasonal produce, native ingredients and a variety of skills we had learnt over the semester.

We chose to serve share plates as this is on-trend, and the seasonal produce we focused on included pumpkin, fennel, rocket and broccoli. When learning about Modern Australian cuisine we discovered that Asia has had a large influence due to migration, therefore we chose to serve Asian Greens with a twist of adding Warrigal Greens (Native Ingredient).

During our course, we learned a variety of cooking techniques and methods like; how to coat a schnitzel, make mayonnaise, from scratch, make stock, knife handling for precision cuts and using modern technologies to help speed up processes in the kitchen. All of which we used to make our recipes on the function day.

We developed our own schnitzel crumb by including Native Pepper Leaf and Native Thyme. Our dessert was more than a regular chocolate pudding, we chose to add Native Wattleleaf, which gave the pudding a coffee flavour. We also made our very own ice cream, infused with Native Strawberry Gum (p.s. this doesn't taste like strawberries) and used an ice-cream machine to churn it. This flavour surprised our guests, but was very well received!

We had a lot of fun working as a team to deliver this function! The atmosphere created was energetic and exciting, and we liked that our event brought the community together to experience something new. A lot of our guests have asked us for the recipes so we are pretty proud that we produced something everyone liked. We would also like to thank Something Wild at the Adelaide Central Markets for supplying the native produce.


