On our way, we stopped for a liturgy on the beach centred around the poem 'Footprints', which links directly to our belief that Jesus

GLEESON TRIUMPHS AT 2019 SCIENCE & ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

Each year Gleeson College participates in the Science and Engineering Challenge (SEC). The SEC is a non-profit, STEM outreach program run throughout the schools year in Australia. The goal of the program is to challenge student's perception of science and engineering and experience aspects of those fields that they normally would not encounter in a school environment.

Students were involved in an exhilarating day competing against other schools in fun and engaging hands-on activities such as designing an earthquake-proof tower, building a hovercraft or bridge, providing electricity efficiently to a city, or creating an environmentally friendly house. Eight schools entered teams of 32 students (from Years 9 and 10) to compete in the Challenge Day. Points were awarded based on their performance and the school with the highest point score at the end of the day was crowned the winner. The 2019 Gleeson College team demonstrated highly effective problem solving skills, outstanding collaboration and an excellent ability to use the engineering design process.

After a lunchtime placing of 6th, students were determined to come home strong. Our bridge-building team waited patiently for their turn to test their structure, quietly confident of its design. Weighing only 86 grams, the bridge managed to withstand over 5 kg of weight allowing them to take out the principle challenge of the day and adding to our overall score. After a suspenseful wait, scores were



revealed for tough competitors such as St Michael's College and Nazareth, until the team realised that it was our team that who had yet to have their score read out. With an impressive score of 1032 out of a possible 1600, Gleeson College was announced as the Regional Champions of the day!

Mr Sellers and I congratulate the students for the enthusiasm and engagement that they demonstrated, for their creativity and persistence required for their success. The

organisers stated that it is the team that work together effectively that are often the most successful, and I can truly say that the Gleeson College team embodied this. Time will tell if our score will allow us to qualify for the State Final later in the year, with more regional challenge days to come.

Again, STEM is alive at Gleeson College!

TRY GLEESON DAYS 2019 > The Italian Project



Phil Cummings - Popular SA picture book author > His latest being Touch the Moon - reflecting on his own childhood experience watching the moon landing on his humble tv in his hometown of Peterborough. Phil says, 'your own life is a story even in the ordinary'. You just need to find the extraordinary.


YEAR 12 MATH METHODS CLASS GOES FLYING!



Over the last week, students in Mr Bond's Year 12 Maths Methods class have been taking one of the College's drones out flying to collect data about its movement. A pressure barometer, attached to the drone, records the drone's height, and an accelerometer records its acceleration in three dimensions.

This data can then be analysed, and using the calculus methods learnt this year, the students can describe the drone's position, velocity, speed, and acceleration, with a bit of help from Desmos. The analysis of the drone's flight forms the core element of this year's Investigation in Stage 2 Maths Methods.

The Year 9 students used their recently acquired knowledge from undertaking their FFSA Level 4 Referee Certificate to officiate competently and fairly and our Year 10 students, also qualified referees, used their experience from last year's tournament to do an excellent job at the event as well.
