Gleeson College's, Reconciliation Week commenced last Friday 25 May, with a group of students attending a joint local council initiative, the 'Reconciliation in the North' Morning Tea. The audience were Welcomed to Country by local elder Frank Wanganeen, listened to keynote speaker Sergeant Danielle James and viewed a cultural performance by Jack Buckskin.

This week, in keeping with the 2018 Reconciliation Week theme, 'Don't Keep History a Mystery', Gleeson's students have had the opportunity to learn more about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and histories.



On Wednesday at lunchtime, Year 12 students from Mrs Pill's, Society and Culture class, ran a game of Battendi, which means to 'throw a spear'. This game was played by Aboriginal people in the Lake Murray, Lake Alexandrina and Lake Albert areas of southern Australia. A prize such as a newly made shield was offered to the winner. The contest was in two parts: distance throwing and target throwing. Students used a vortex instead of a spear to try their luck at hitting the kangaroo target. On Friday, students had the opportunity to contribute to a Reconciliation Week poster, which will be used in future Reconciliation Week celebrations.

GLEESON PROGRESS IN OPEN KO WITH 4-1 WIN OVER BLACKFRIARS



A lot was at stake in Round 4 of the Twilight Soccer League versus Blackfriars Priory College, as this match would also double up as our opening round fixture for the Open Boys Knockout Soccer Competition.

The opening half saw us start slowly, with the boys not quite able to find their groove and the needed intensity early in the match. Blackfriars were able to capitalise on our slow start and opened the scoring mid-way through the first half. Some much needed saves from goalkeeper Rocco Carzo (11 HSPLL) and

some inaccuracy in front of goals from the Blackfriars team allowed us to go in trailing only 1-0 at the break. Half time had Coach Dion Kirk questioning the intensity and effort of the players and the boys were able to respond in the second half. From the beginning of the last half we were able to get ourselves on the ball and start to control possession. When we were not on the ball, we pressed well with intensity to win the ball back quickly. A forward movement of sharp combination passing between Harrison Conant (10 MSCOD) and Isaac Mullen (12 FSHOL) resulted in a ball being played out to Douglas Westover (11 HSFEL) on the right wing, who took a touch to settle before finishing to the nearside of the keeper. The levelling goal seemed to inspire the boys, particularly Westover who in almost the next passage of play carried the ball dangerously into the box before being fouled, and then awarded a penalty for Gleeson. Mullen stepped up to convert the penalty to the keepers left to give us the lead. The boys then continued to assert themselves on the contest with Conant looking particularly dangerous with his pace and ability to take on defenders. From one of these mazy runs Conant was able to step inside his defender in order to finish from the edge of the box with a low drive to beat the keeper. With the game done and won, Captain Cory Riccio (12 DSHUT) added the icing on the cake when he took on the defender at the top of the box, and from just outside the area, beat the keeper with a hard and low shot into the bottom corner of the net.

The 4-1 win against Blackfriars was the perfect start to our Open Knockout Soccer campaign for the 2018 season and a great way to get our Twilight campaign back on track after a disappointing result last week. Mullen was influential in midfield and was able to impose himself on the contest. When asked about the game he said, *"After a fairly poor first half performance we bounced back and worked hard to get back into the game. It was good to see the younger boys playing well and we are now starting to gel as a team. It was great that we could get the result we needed in order to progress in the Knockout Competition and climb back up the Twilight ladder."*

We are looking forward to building on this result when we take on Christian Brothers College in Round 5 of the Twilight Soccer League.

YEAR 9 JAPANESE > Middle School Languages Learning

As part of the Gleeson College Middle School Curriculum, all students have the opportunity to learn Japanese and Italian in their first year of high school, and then follow their chosen preference into Year 9 and beyond.

This can be a daunting task as it requires a whole new set of skills, but often, students thrive in this learning environment. For many, the skills that are picked up in these early years of high school language classes become highly valued in the adult years when travelling abroad. While there is an emphasis on reading and writing in Japanese and Italian classes, quite often it is the speaking and listening abilities that prove most valuable later in life.

With this in mind, many of the Year 9 Japanese classes have undertaken some focused conversation practice in class this week, with the goal of making all of our students more confident to refine this talent. This week's speaking task focused around two key questions: かぞくは何人ですか (how many people are in your family?), and ペットがいますか (do you have any pets?).

Students were able to build confidence and spoken clarity by inquiring into the family and home life of their classmates and refine their listening and inference skills by interpreting the various answers they heard back.

The students stated that this was a fun and engaging way to practice aural and oral language skills, and by the end of the activity, were already feeling like they were becoming better language users. This will come as great news to parents if they are planning a trip to Japan in a few years' time and are in need of a free travelling translator!

BIGGEST MORNING TEA RECIPES TO TRY AT HOME!

Sticky Date Cupcakes

Makes 18 Prep 30 mins (+ soaking & cooling time) Cooking 20 mins

Ingredients >

Sticky Date Cupcakes

300g pitted dates
2 tsp bicarb soda
2 cups (500ml) boiling water
100g unsalted butter, softened
1 cup (220g) caster sugar
2 eggs
1 2/3 cups (250g) plain flour
2 tsp baking powder
1 Granny Smith apple, cored, peeled and coarsely grated
1/2 cup (50g) walnuts, finely chopped

Cream Cheese Icing

100g butter, softened
250g cream cheese, softened
3/4 cup (120g) icing sugar mixture, sifted

Salted caramel topping to decorate
Finely chopped walnuts, extra, to decorate

Method >

- Preheat oven to 180C. Line 18 holes of two 1/3-cup muffin pans with paper cases. Place dates and bicarb soda in heatproof bowl. Pour over boiling water, set aside for 10 mins.
- Transfer the date mixture to a food processor and process until a thick



paste forms. Use an electric mixer to beat unsalted butter and sugar in a bowl until pale and creamy. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in date mixture. Sift over flour and baking powder. Fold to combine. Stir in apple and walnuts.

- Divide mixture evenly in paper cases and bake for 15-20 mins or until top springs back when gently pressed. Turn onto wire rack to cool.
- Use an electric mixer to beat butter, cream cheese and icing sugar in a bowl until pale and fluffy. Place in a piping bag fitted with a 1cm fluted nozzle. Pipe over cupcakes and drizzle with caramel topping. Sprinkle with extra chopped walnuts.

Roast Pumpkin Hummus

Ingredients >

250g pumpkin, peeled, cut in small pieces
400g can chickpeas, rinsed & drained
2 tablespoons tahini
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon ground cumin
1 garlic clove, crushed
2 tablespoons fresh coriander, chopped

Method >

- Place pumpkin on a lined baking tray. Spray with oil and roast at 180C for 25 mins or until golden.
- Place roast pumpkin, chickpeas, tahini, lemon juice, ground cumin and garlic clove in a food processor. Season. Process until smooth. Stir in fresh coriander.



Four reasons why your child or teen may be anxious

Increasingly, Australian children and teenagers are experiencing anxiety at levels that are affecting their mental health, school achievement and happiness. As a loving parent you naturally want to prevent your child or young person from being overwhelmed by anxiety.

There are four main reasons your child may be experiencing anxiety.

1. You are passing your anxiety and stress on to your child

Anxiety is a function of groups – it rarely happens in isolation. Many parents I meet in my work are stressed by their lives and fearful for their children. The contagious nature of anxiety means that parents often pass their stresses, worries and fears on to their children. Legendary psychologist Martin Seligman found through his research that children have a significant propensity to copy their primary parents' explanatory style by eight years of age. If parents see events through the frame of stress, anxiety and fear then they are passing this same frame on to their children.

2. Your child is overloaded

Few would argue that an active child is a healthy child. However it seems that we now have too much of a good thing as Australian kids have a smorgasbord of organised pre-school and after-school activities to keep their minds and bodies active. Many of these activities have a high performance element attached (get that badge, win that game, attain that level) so that kids are always striving or attaining. The pressure to perform is always there. Activity overload is a particular problem for achievement-driven, anxious types of kids – classic first-born child characteristics.




3. Your child doesn't play enough

Play is the release valve for the pressures of a high performance, serious life. It's the way kids have always relaxed and let off steam. The best type of play for relaxing and letting off steam is generally physical play that takes place outside. Your child may play a great deal on a digital device, but this activity stimulates the brain rather than rejuvenates it.

Organised sport doesn't fit the play category if it adds to their anxiety rather than releases it. Kids need to be involved in play that's fun, rejuvenating and enjoyable. They need to look forward to it rather than fear it.

Four reasons why your child or teen may be anxious

4. Your child focuses too much on the future

Some children are born to worry. They fret about seemingly simple activities such as starting a new school term, going to a birthday party or who's picking them up from school at the end of the day. Worriers are future oriented, anxious about things that haven't happened yet. These type-A anxious types don't know how to stay in the present. Their minds constantly wander ahead to what may happen. They benefit from learning relaxation techniques such as mindfulness and deep breathing that anchor them to the present, temporarily releasing them from their worries and anxieties. When kids learn these techniques from a young age or even during adolescence they are likely to become hard-wired for life.



There is so much we can do to equip children with the tools they need to manage their anxiousness and worries, and to prevent these from accelerating into full blown, debilitating anxiety. We can start by looking at our own lifestyles and make changes that may alleviate the stresses that inevitably trickle down to our kids. We can also take a look at our kid's lifestyles and activities and make sure they contain a healthy balance between high performance and fun. Most importantly, we can provide kids with the tools and skills to recognise, manage and cope with anxiousness so that they have autonomy over their own mental health and wellbeing, both now and into the future.
