National Science Week is Australia's annual celebration of science and technology. Running each year in August, it features more than 1000 events around Australia, including those delivered by universities, schools, research institutions, libraries, museums and science centres. These events attract a wide audience from children to adults, and science amateurs to professionals. Over one million people participate in science events across the nation.

Established in 1997, National Science Week provides an opportunity to acknowledge the contributions of Australian scientists to the world of knowledge. It also aims to encourage an interest in science pursuits among the general public, and to encourage younger people to be fascinated by the world we live in.

This year's theme was Destination Moon, as 2019 marks the 50th anniversary of the Apollo 11 landing. On July 20 1969, the Apollo 11 mission was the first crewed landing on the moon. It deployed instruments, took photographs, collected samples, and safely returned the crew and samples back to Earth.

To celebrate Science Week our Care Groups and Staff participated in daily quizzes, with daily winners celebrated with prizes. Staff also enjoyed a yummy moon themed morning tea prepared by the Science faculty with treats including starry cupcakes, asteroid bliss balls and of course lot of Mars bars and Milky Way chocolates. SciWorld visited our College with their giant inflatable StarDome, exciting our Year 7 and 8 students with a journey into the night sky, looking at star constellations, planets, galaxies and more. Rocket Scientists Alex and

Corey led workshops with our Year 9s to construct accurate launchable rockets. The Week 4 Personal Development Program lessons were also spaced themed for the Middle School. Classes investigated nutrition in space and created some yummy space shakes, along with the difficulties of drinking their creations without the convenience of a cup!

Science Week always provides a great opportunity to highlight the diversity of the discipline, and the many ways there are to be scientific by being scientific in our everyday lives!


Peer Pressure > the final session of the night was an UNO card game, which incorporated questions and conversations between students discussing issues young people can experience socially.

The One+ Science Investigation Awards is a Campus initiative to showcase investigations that students have carried out in or out of the classroom. The Year 8 and Year 9 team completed their investigations in their own time, designing their experiments, conducting them, and evaluating their results. Students then presented their findings using a poster board.

On Friday 2nd August, students were invited to share their investigations with STEM professionals and members of our community including Kevin Knight, mayor of Tea Tree Gully and Paula Luethen, Parliament Member for King. The teams answered questions, and demonstrated maturity through the way they explained their investigations to the judges throughout the morning.

I am proud to announce that the Year 8 team placed 3rd overall. Jack Taylor, Aidan Barry, Kyal Johnston and Thomas Rigney's investigation explored the methods of improving basketball shot accuracy.

Samuel Borg and Ashlee Heffernan investigated the impact of light colour on plant growth. Their project was awarded the People's Choice Award on the day, which is another excellent result.

Both teams will progress to the Food and Fibre Science Investigation Awards held as part of the Royal Adelaide Show. I congratulate the students on the dedication they showed to take on work on top of their study commitments, and commend them on the manner in which they represented the College. ASX SHAREMARKET OPENS FOR BUDDING GC ENTREPRENEURS




The bell was rung to launch the 2019 ASX Sharemarket Game at lunchtime last Thursday 15 August.

YEAR 9 SCIENCE > *Every move we make is reflected in water...*

Located at Urrbrae Agricultural High School, Netherby, the Urrbrae Wetland Project was one of the first urban wetland developments within close range of residential areas to be attempted in Australia. It is a living example of what can be achieved when government and the community work together towards common goals.


Its primary goal was to alleviate the long standing flooding problem along Cross Roads and the regular water logging of the Urrbrae Agricultural High School farmlands.

The successful integration of the Urrbrae Wetland wild aquatic and plant life within an Urban Environment has created a widely used example and a reference point for the future use of urban wetlands across the world. Wetlands represent transitional areas between land and water. The balanced ecosystem of Wetlands relies upon the interaction between living factors such as plants and animals and nonliving, abiotic factors. The importance of balance in biological systems is explored in Year 9 Science, and formed the basis of study for our most recent unit of work.

Early in Term 3, all classes ventured to the Urrbrae Wetlands Learning Centre to engage in a hands on day, highlighting the functionality, and importance of such constructed ecosystems. Students were lead around the Wetlands, sampling water at various locations. These samples were then tested back in the Learning Centre, providing rich discussions around factors of water quality such as turbidity, salinity and dissolved oxygen levels. Students then went netting for macroinvertebrates and used microscopes to quantify and identify what they had found. Evaluations of such sampling provided important insights about the health of the system and the biodiversity it supports.

Importantly all study conducted through the day allowed students to see their learning in the real world, to see how construction can support the environment when considered ethically and sustainably.

The team bus, packed with support staff and supporters, ventured an hour and a half to Flinders University Stadium on Wednesday 7 August. Pumped full of excitement and anticipation, the girls suited up and prepared themselves for what would be a massive task on a huge deck that is South Adelaide's home ground. Cardijn College had a much easier travel to the oval, only needing to walk across the road to arrive!

The occasion didn't seem to overwhelm the girls with typical locker room banter being thrown around in a very relaxed atmosphere. We knew that any team making a KO Grand Final would be extremely good, however our main focus centred around what we could control. 

Protecting your child's online privacy

From sharing pictures of a child's first day at school to key moments at high school, many adults don't consider the potential risks or breach of future privacy for kids. In fact, it is now become a ritual to announce the full name and date of birth of a child online within hours of them being born. This is just the beginning of a child's digital footprint.

Although children are now 'born digital', exposure in the online world can present just as many risks as the physical world can pose. Images and identifying details can be used for numerous activities that put your child at risk, from stalking, to cyberbullying, identity theft, and even digital kidnapping.

The Australian eSafety Commission warns that half of all images on paedophile image-sharing sites originate from social media sites and blogs. Parents are responsible for protecting kids until they are old enough to make their own decisions about their online presence.

So, what can parents do?

Start by 'thinking privacy' before posting images of children online. You'll be protecting their digital footprint and setting them up for a healthy relationship with the digital world.

Seek consent

Always ask others before sharing images of their children, even your family. Speak up about how you feel about images of your child being shared. When your child is old enough, ask them for consent, empowering them to understand they have a right to their privacy online. As they become teenagers, hopefully they will have more respect for what they post online and have confidence to speak to others about their consent guidelines.

Understand the settings

Check the settings of your social media channels to ensure your posts are not public. Speak to your friends and family about this and don't be afraid to ask for help to get it right. If your child has social media channels of their own, go through the settings with them to minimise the risk of unwanted shares.

Think about the detail

Avoid including children's identifiable details such as school badges, logos, uniforms, name tags or identifiable locations such as your home area or school. Alternatively, blur these details prior to posting.

Be selective

Create a simple checklist to help make decisions regarding posting online easy. What do you deem appropriate? Are you happy to share images of your children in swimwear? Do you want to avoid full-frontal face shots?

If your child is old enough, explain why you are selecting certain pictures and not sharing others. If you have a teenager who is sharing their own images, talk to them about what is appropriate and potential repercussions of not setting boundaries.

Remove metadata

Metadata on digital images records the time, date and GPS coordinates of where the photo was taken and can be accessed through shared images, and your sharing service may record your IP address. You can wipe this information with appropriate software or share screenshots of your photos to avoid metadata sharing. Screenshot sharing creates a lower resolution photo, so it's less likely to be tampered with by a third party.

Think 'privacy first' to reduce many of the risks involved with image sharing. Have conversations with your children to instil this mentality; help them build empathy; and identify the steps for minimising risk whilst helping them build a healthy relationship with technology so they can become responsible digital citizens.
